It has been a whirlwind start to the year. So much is happening, with swimming, sailing, technology, Te Reo, and the Arts programme as well as the core business of maths, reading and writing! The classrooms are busy, buzzing places. We are spending the first few weeks of this year looking at what it means to be a citizen in a democratic society. To make sense of this we have linked our learning to Waitangi Day and to the Flag Referendum. Your child may have come home with questions and information regarding the two flags. We are encouraging them to become 'future active, engaged citizens' of New Zealand by participating in the democratic process. We have registered our school to take part in Kids Voting. Students will choose between the alternative flag from the first referendum and the current New Zealand flag, and compare their results with the results of the real referendum. The topic is very interesting, and challenging to us, as well as to the children. Do engage with your child over this, and show them how great it is to be living in a country where we get to have our say.
